~HOW TO MINISTER IN OUR INCREASINGLY CULTURALLY COMPLEX SOCIETY

Many pastors embrace the value of culturally diverse ministry, but find their actual experience of it to be frustrating and confusing. *God's Tapestry: Understanding and Celebrating Differences*, written by William Kondrath and published by the Alban Institute, is an excellent resource for pastors and churches considering how to minister in our increasingly culturally complex society. Reflecting on the personal challenges we experience as we seek to open up to those who are different from us, this book provides

thoughtful spiritual companionship for pastors and churches on this journey. The basic theoretical constructs and practical exercises that are included make this a valuable resource to use with key church leadership. For example, by separately considering personal, interpersonal, institutional and cultural aspects of dealing with differences, he increases the likelihood for constructive conversation rather than the frustration that usually ensues when these four areas are conflated. Overall, Kondrath is hopeful without being Pollyannaish about the growth that can happen in a church that seeks to value diversity. – *Rev.
