Updating the Learning Guide for the Ethics Code/Covenant

Rev. Dr. Bonny Dillon to Provide Guidance to the Ethics Code

In the November 2020 annual business meeting the national Ministers Council voted to approve revisions to the Covenant and Code of Ethics all American Baptist ministers sign at ordination. Our chapter of Chaplains and Pastoral Counselors voted in March 2021 to approve it as well, with a unanimous "yes" for all voting members.

Now, the Learning Guide for the Covenant and Code of Ethics must be updated, not only to include the recent revisions, but to take a fresh look at the entire document to provide clergy the best opportunity to fully engage the ethical and covenantal implications of our ministries. We are fortunate to have Bonny Dillon representing our chapter and the interests and needs of chaplains and pastoral counselors on the new Learning Guide committee. The Rev. Dr. Dillon is the former chair of the Human Services Department at Bluefield State College and has a great deal of experience in ethics. Bonny has graduate study and certification in bio-ethics with specialization in clinical ethics. She has taught bio-ethics in a number of institutions, and was an associate professor of professional ethics at LCC International University in Lithuania.





Sacred Rites at Sea

In the picture below is I am officiating at a burial at sea onboard the aircraft carrier USS RONALD REAGAN (CVN 76). Officiating at a Burial At Sea Ceremony is a very humbling honor. The military as a whole, and the Navy specifically, honor their shipmate with the burial. The ship comes to a full stop, all hands cease work (as best they can to maintain safety of the ship), to render honors to the dead. The ashes are buried at sea during the funeral service with scripture, prayer and a sermon. The Ship's Commanding Officer speaks on behalf of the Navy and all shipmates. Often the entire ship is involved in the structure of the funeral service. The Operations Department gives guidance on wind and ship direc-



tion, the Engineering Department creates a memorial burial structure (as seen in the picture above), and the Deck Department readies the funeral service area on the ship's deck. The silhouetted picture of the Chaplain above symbolic. All Navy Chaplains are called to serve our Sea Service Personnel through this sacred rite.

The second picture, shows me on the ship's microphone is during evening prayer at sea which is a longstanding tradition for our military ships. At 2255 hours, or


10:55 p.m. for our civilian brothers and sisters, there is evening prayer. This is the time right before "Taps" is played over the ship's intercom system signifying the day is over. However, the



ship is a 24-hour operation so what may be the end of the day for some, the day is just beginning for others. The prayer is given to offer the message of God's hope, inspire spiritual resiliency and ensure all faith backgrounds are able to connect with the prayer. In past prayers I have recited scripture, shared personal stories and quoted good ol' Snoopy from Charles Schultz to connect the events of the day with God's word for the crew. This is a very intentional prayer as the entire ship's intercom systems transmit the prayer from the deepest engineering spaces to the highest watch standers on the top decks.


I begin this with a bit of personal reflection. It seems like the best way to help you get to know me and who I am when I step into my work as a chaplain. In August I will not only celebrate my 45th Birthday, but I will also celebrate my 20th year of being in chaplaincy. I have spent my adult years growing up as a chaplain. Reflecting on that, I have realized that who I am personally has become intimately intertwined with who I am professionally. It is not uncommon to find me talking with staff about the latest Marvel movie or sharing stories of our favorite Dungeons and Dragons (yes, I play regularly) characters. I can be found commiserating on the joys and pains of raising a teenager or sharing pictures of our newest family member, our dog Charlie. These conversations have led staff to trust me with some deeply holy moments, inviting me intimately into their lives when they are in need of support. But it is not just with staff that I have found this particular sacred ground. When I am willing to take all of me - wife, daughter, mother, Dungeons and Dragons player, Tai Chi practitioner— into the room, I move ever closer to the fullness of what God has created in me, to God's call of me to chaplaincy. Take, for example, one of my treasured pandemic chaplaincy moments.

Shortly after our hospital finally started allowing visitors in, I found myself in the room of a young lady just out of high school, her

mom at the bedside. The Mom has asked me to come and help support her daughter cope with many health challenges that had changed her plans and dreams for the future. As we three talked, the mom began to open up, with her daughter's encouragement. I can't remember the whole conversation, but I do remember the room became a sacred space of mutual caring, vulnerability and ultimately healing. As a chaplain I knew how to listen deeply and ask the right questions, but it was my momma's heart that made the deeper connections hearing things in ways only I could, because I took all of me into that room. At the end of the visit, they asked me to pray with them. I did the unthinkable at the time and took the offered hand and prayed, keeping my eyes open. As I prayed, I witnessed this mom become almost giddy with joy. At the end of the prayer she asked, "can you feel it - the warmth?" She shared that muscles that had been sore finally felt relaxed; she felt hungry, something she had not felt for a while. She felt hope. She said," she had not felt this relaxed and at peace for over a year" The patient in the bed, with tears of joy saw her mom accept and receive soul care and healing. She said, that she was sure I was supposed to be there not for her, but for her mother. It was a beautiful God moment in the midst of the uncertainty and fear of the middle of the pandemic.


