Shalom in the Midst of Suffering

My name is Petra. Today I was present with tearful parents feeling helpless and powerless in the face of their child's unexpected life-threatening condition. We shared a sacred space being, feeling, and praying together. I touched the mom's shoulder and said, "I feel you. I've been there." It's all I needed to say. The mom let her tears flow as she shared her fears and doubts. I was the same way when our teen-age son, now a grown man, had cancer. Years later, I still remember how helpless, powerless, and devasted my husband and I felt.

As a former hospice chaplain, I ministered to many adults at the end of their lives. Their suffering, deaths, and family's grief were heartbreaking. But a child's suffering seems so wrong, so senseless. When parents try to make sense of the senseless and ask. "Why, God?" I cannot give an answer. But I can be with them in the flood of emotion and help find solid ground, remembering God's promise in Isaiah 43:2: When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the river, they shall not overwhelm you.

A chronically ill teenage patient once said to me, "The doctor explained my illness and its prognosis. I have talked long and often with God about missing out on life and why I have such immense pain. God is with me. I am not afraid anymore."

The teenager had found God's shalom, that inner peace and sense of wholeness coming from God in the midst of trouble and suffering. Jesus says in John 14:27, "Shalom I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Don't let your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid."

Shalom is the fulness of God's presence in our life circumstances. When we turn to God in our pain and suffering, God draws near. We can pour out our laments before God. It engages God in our pain and trouble. Therefore, I encourage parents to honestly share in prayer with God their grief, fears, doubts, anger, guilt, and shame. I practice honesty when I say I don't have an answer to, "Why does an allpowerful, all-knowing God let my child suffer or die?" I invite them to acknowledge and express their questions and doubts to God through lament. Sometimes it brings relief.

We have access to God who loves, listens, and walks with us. God is with grieving parents, with a teenager silently suffering from an eating disorder, and with a toddler with a tumor. God is also present with and through amazing, dedicated healthcare workers, caring 24/7 for these children. God is present with and through me as I pray with parents, listen at a teenager's bedside, or bless a preemie with heart failure.


During my son's hospitalization years ago, a chaplain was instrumental in bringing God's presence and peace when we needed it. Her words didn't change our situation, but God's enveloping shalom gave us peace and comfort beyond words. It even inspired me to become a chaplain.

How Jesus was with children, bringing healing, wholeness, and even laughter, guides my work with children and their families. Like he did, I show up and do all I can to connect them with God's peace and presence, the essence of Shalom.

Tech Support REP : How can I help you today? CUSTOMER: Well, after much consideration, I've decided to install love. Can you guide me through the process?

turn off GRUDGE . EXE and RESENTMENT .COM. Those programs prevent love from being properly installed. Can you turn them off?

REP: LOVE is freeware. Be sure to give it and its various modules to everybody you meet. They will in turn share it with other people and they will return some similarly cool modules back to you.

Look Upon Them as Wounded

After vaccinating a young boy with an injection in the arm, a doctor wanted to stick on a bandage. "Please put it on the other arm," the boy pleaded.

"Why do that?" the doctor asked. "This will let everyone know you have been vaccinated and they won't hit your sore arm."

"Please put it on my other arm! Please!" the boy begged. "You don't know the kids at my school." The boy did and wasn't about to let them

at his arm.

Adults, too, are pretty good at hiding pain. Not usually physical pain, but the kind of pain that's

harder to see. They like to appear as if they are in control; they can handle whatever life throws them; they're on top of it. And, too often, they end up going it alone. No one understands. No one is there to help.

Susan Muto, in her book Blessings That Make Us Be, tells a story of a great ruler who needed a second-in-command to help manage his kingdom. When he finally selected the right person, he took him outside onto a balcony of the palace where they could gaze over all the lands under his jurisdiction. "My son," the king replied, "there is only one directive to follow – and that is to look upon the people as wounded."


The wise king knew that everyone is in pain in some way. Wounds may not show, but they are there.



Self Care for Such a Time as This

We are chaplains and pastoral counselors trained and committed to serve Jesus Christ through ministry to others in need of healing and hope. And yet, we are too often tempted to take care of others and skimp on self-care. Preaching to others the need to balance body, mind, and spirit is easy. Practicing it ourselves is hard. Look back over the previous week. How did you minister to others each day? What self-care, done each day, would have enriched your ministry to others? Likewise, if we as individuals practice self care that includes all facets of our health, we will be better stewards of our gift of life.



God is Present -Howard W. Thurman

God is present with me this day. God is present with me in the midst of my anxieties. I affirm in my own heart and mind the reality of God's presence. God makes immediately available to me the strength of Divine goodness, the reassurance of Divine wisdom and the heartiness of Divine courage. My anxieties are real; they are the result of a wide variety of experiences, some of which I understand, some of which I do not understand. One thing I know concerning my anxieties: they are real to me. Sometimes they seem more real than the presence of God. When this happens, they dominate my mood and possess my thoughts. The presence of God does not always deliver me from anxiety but it always delivers me from anxieties. Little by little, I am beginning to understand that deliverance from anxiety means fundamental growth in spiritual character and awareness. It becomes a quality of being, emerging from deep within, giving to all the dimensions of experience a vast immunity against being anxious. A ground of calm underlines experiences whatever may be the tempestuous character of events. This calm is the manifestation in life of the active, dynamic Presence of God.
